



CASA VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR: TERRY WRIGHT

Terry Wright has been a CASA since December 2020 and has always been a leader amongst the other CASAs. She is a true CASA cheerleader with her positive outlook on every situation. Terry has advocated for 7 children during her time with CASA and has fiercely advocated for permanency. She has accepted three cases at once to ensure that each child had an advocate on their side. She encourages people to speak their truth and never displays any judgment.

Previous families still keep in touch with her when issues arise because they know that she will help find the right resources or connect them with the right person to talk to. Not only has Terry advocated locally for her CASA children, but she has traveled to Atlanta to advocate for policy change and regularly talks to policymakers about child welfare.





THE BRIGHT HOUSE

A 35-year-old woman was referred to the Bright House due to ongoing substance abuse challenges. In September 2022, she began visiting her 1-year-old son twice per week. During her time with us, Mom was attentive, loving, and compassionate to her son. Mom took accountability for why her child was placed in foster care and was determined to cooperate with DFCS to become reunited with her child. Unfortunately, there were several obstacles in Mom's way. Mom would share those obstacles with her FSS and they would discuss ways to overcome them in order to achieve reunification. Many community partners left her discouraged and at times she felt her hard work would be done in vain. However, these brief pitfalls and hopeless moments did not stop her from pushing through the challenge.

Mom and FSS discussed the importance of being surrounded by a village. As a result, Mom took the initiative to join an online Mom Support Group. In doing so, Mom found her village and was educated on ways to properly communicate with foster parents. Due to this newfound confidence, she was able to build a friendly rapport with her son's foster parent; which allowed her to be updated daily on his progress. Although this was a success, Mom still faced the biggest challenge of them all; her DFCS case plan. Often, Mom did not have access to her case manager and was left in the dark about the court-ordered referrals that DFCS needed to complete in order for Mom to engage in rehabilitation services. Because of this, Mom took her independence a step further by researching programs and services that were aligned with the tasks on her case plan. DFCS and the Courts acknowledged Mom's diligent efforts by granting her reunification in January 2023. The Bright House team is thrilled to have been a part of this family's triumph story!





DFCS Partnership

Savannah CASA continued to improve our relationship with the Department of Family and Children Services (DFCS). With COVID-19 behind us and staff back in person more, Savannah CASA was able to implement more to help the partnership with DFCS:

- Monthly DFCS supervisor/CASA coordinator staffings
- Coordinated and delivered Christmas gifts to foster children
- Assisted with case research
- Assistance with children who have to spend time at the DFCS office
- Joint Training Opportunities
- Celebrated a Caseworker of the Month/Year
- Trunk or Treat Event and Easter Egg Hunt

Juvenile Court Partnership

Savannah CASA is only as strong as our relationship with our Juvenile Court Judges. Our advocates can only serve on a case if appointed by one of our judges. CASA staff works closely with the Juvenile Court to ensure that we are responsive and proactive in supporting their work. In addition to providing CASA volunteers to be appointed to dependency cases, Savannah CASA provides additional advocacy to Family Treatment Court (families impacted by substance use disorder), HOPE Court (youth who have been trafficked) and SPARC (youth with significant mental health concerns).

- Participate in truancy stakeholder meetings
- Participate in Court Improvement Initiatives
- Meet regularly with Judges and Juvenile Court leadership
- Participate in joint trainings
- Participate in Work Group to increase foster parent recruitment
